DUTIES OF SUPERVISORS AND CO-ORDINATORS

A supervisor helps to promote the different activities and to get people interested in them. They plan all public dances, different public social functions and in doing so try to keep the colonists morale on a high standard.

For Club Activities- Waka Mochizuki is doing the supervising. Various boys clubs girls clubs like the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Girl Reserves and others come under this department.

Entertainments- Headed by George Okada, the entertainment department promotes public dances, Japanese shibais, and talent revues.

It was once announced in the project paper that no more dances would be held in the mess halls because of unsanitary reasons but, Mr. Townsend said that some method would be adopted where-by curtains or drapes could be dropped so that the dust could not get into the kitchen during these dances. Mr. Townsend stated that there would be as many dances as there are demands for them by the public.

Music Activities supervisor is Mrs. Maye Hara. This dept. sponsors many record concerts and some community sings.

Arts and Crafts supervisor- Mrs. Morishita. This department puts on displays of greasewood art and art sketches. These greasewood displays are very popular with the old folks.

Athletic program is headed by Chick Uno. At this time there are no activities going on but during the season various football leagues were formed and were succesful.

Later, when more equipment is available leagues for baseball, football, and other sports will be formed when the season calls for them.

Childrens Activities supervisor was formerly Jean Morii but now this department has been switched over to the school program.

Co-ordinators- There are seven different co-ordinators, one for each section in the project. The co-ordinators job is mainly to get the people in his respective section interested in the different activities, clubs, and to help the activity supervisors whenever the need arises.

LIBRARIES

ENGLISH LIBRARY

For literature loving people, there are two public libraries situated in this camp---one in Recreation 8 and the other in Recreation 31. These libraries have about 6000 books, 3000 books in each, covering the subjects of fictions, philosophy, religion, business and economics, science, social science, biographies, history, and etc. Most of these books were donated by the Seattle Public Library, Seattle Civilians War Commissioners, W.P.A. Library Project, and the Oregon State Library, but a few were donated by individuals in this camp.


JAPANESE LIBRARY



PLAYGROUNDS

A number of playgrounds are to be in use in the near future. Work on these playgrounds are expected to be started after winter when all the frost is out of the ground. These playgrounds will have outdoor basketball courts, baseball and softball fields, and tennis courts, but every one of these playgrounds will not have tennis courts. These playgrounds will be placed---west of Block I---south of Block 8---north of Block I7---between Blocks 32 and 34---south of 4I. The central playground will be near the ice-skating rink close to the high school.

For smaller children sandboxes for them to play in will be in numerous places through-out the project. These not only be an enjoyment for the smaller children but also a help to keep them out of mischief and danger.

AUDITORIUM-GYMNASIUM

Sometime in the future a large auditorium-gymnasium will be in use. Plans for a large floor where basketball, volleyball, and other indoor sports may be played is made. A building like this is badly needed as a proper place for large mass meetings, movies, dances, etc. is needed. Requisitions have been put in for lumber and plumbing materials and others that will be needed for such a construction. Work on this building is expected to start by next May.

OUTSIDE GAMES

Many people have requested permission to go to high schools outside of this project to play the school teams in some competitive sport, but it is definite that no team from this project may go outside to play because of transportation problems and gas rationing

SWIMMING POOL

A swimming pool is being considered in order to advance recreational activities. The greatest problem which is holding back the construction of the pool is the water supply.

The most profitable method of obtaining the water is from the canal which runs along the outside skirts of this Camp.

But since it is not the property of the W.R.A. it would be difficult to obtain water from there.

The pool cannot be made out of cement because of the immense cost. If made we must use dirt which does not hold water very well.

The drainage system brings up another problem. Since there must be a constant rotating of water there has to be a constant rotating of water, there has to be a constant flow of water. Chlorination is another method of purifying the pool's water.

Since there is to be absolutely no swimming in the Canal this coming summer, they are more than anxious to get started on the pool. Most appropriate place for this pool would be near blocks twelve or twenty-one. The depth of the pool is to be 20 feet with the size about 400 feet by 400 feet. If everything works in favor of building it, they will probably commence in Spring sometime.

ICE-SKATING RINK

Welcome news for local ice-skating fans came when work started on Hunt's skating rink on the west side of Block 2I. This rink, mostly through the work of the high school boys under the supervision of "Chick" Uno, athletic supervisor, was recently cleared of debris, set up stakes and dykes, and ready for flooding. This rink was planned to be 300 feet by 300 feet but due to lack of necessary equipments, it was made as large as possible. But now the place is being flooded. Water is being put in by degrees and approximately 240,000 gallons of water is expected to go in this rink.

Preparations are made in dividing this rink into three sections; one, for beginners; another, for hockey games, and the other, for the general public.

High lighting this ice-skating rink will be the "Icecapade Review of 1943". This review will be performed by talented skaters from through-out the camp.

"If plans work as they should," says "Chick" Uno, "music skating and skating parties will be held in the near future."

SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

BOYS

Since there are not enough recreational equipments, the boys in their physical education classes are learning tactics of sports such as: football, baseball, tennis, softball, volleyball, and etc.

Also the boys are helping to make an ice-skating rink by clearing the field of debris and setting up dykes and stakes. In the very near future, ice-skating is expected to be inaugurated. When the weather permits, field practices will begin for the above mentioned sports.


GIRLS
